#### Resurrection: New Beginnings & New Opportunities - by Pastor David Piscatelli

Luke 24:1-12 (NRS) But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. <sup>2</sup>They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, <sup>3</sup>but when they went in, they did not find the body. <sup>4</sup>While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. <sup>5</sup>The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. <sup>6</sup>Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, <sup>7</sup>that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again." <sup>8</sup>Then they remembered his words, <sup>9</sup>and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. <sup>10</sup>Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. <sup>11</sup>But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. <sup>12</sup>But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened.

Luke's account of the resurrection story portrays the anxiety, stress, and joyful reaction to the unexpected work of God. The women and the disciples had watched in horror as the religious leaders, the crowds, and the Romans proceeded to brutally beat the Son of God and nail Him to a Cross like a criminal. It was merely a week earlier, that they had accompanied Him into the city of Jerusalem with fanfare and shouts of "Hosanna! Hosanna!". They never thought something like this could ever happen, until it did. As they approach the tomb, they were expecting to find the crucified body of Jesus. The empty tomb only adds to their grief, at least at first. The women are terrified and perplexed. When they become aware that Jesus is risen, they run back to tell the disciples, only to be mocked and not believed. Not until after Peter sees for himself, do things start to move forward. The resurrection brings new beginning and opportunities. God's work in Jesus did not end at the cross, it became more glorious than they could ever imagine. Their work as disciples did not end; they become His witnesses to the broken world as the first believers formed faith communities that would become the church.

Most people don't like change, especially when it is unexpected. Change causes anxiety, stress, and sometimes major alterations to our lives. Adapting to a new child in the house can be quite an upsetting ordeal for parents, even as it is a time of joyful celebration. A new diagnosis in our health can require major shifts in our lifestyles, particularly if it is unwelcome and we didn't see it coming. New jobs, new responsibilities, and even the process of a pastoral change necessitate adjustments in perspectives, actions, and attitudes. These situations are certainly not as dramatic as the Resurrection of Christ, but they do remind us that God constantly uses events of this world to bring about transformation. Without the dreary winter weather, spring wouldn't feel so glorious. Without death, there would be no resurrection. Without change, there would never be new beginnings or new opportunities. While not every new situation is greater than we imagine, the grace and love of God usually is.

During Lent, we had the opportunity to hear the sermon series on Grace: Experiencing the Goodness of God in a broken world. Grace is an outflowing of God's love that invites us to experience God's goodness in salvation, mercy, healing, and resurrection. God is present in both the joyful times of our lives and those times of unwanted difficulty. When we go through change, God not only provides us strength to handle the challenges of life, God invites us to see new possibilities as opportunities for new beginnings.

God's greatest work is in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. And God continues to be active in the broken world around us, seeking to strengthen the faith of believers today, just like those believers on the first Easter. We are Easter people; those whose role is to be ambassadors of Jesus Christ by sharing the love of God and our experiences with those others. Regardless of the changes life brings, may we see God at work and trust that God's goodness goes in front of us, behind us, and with us every step of the way.




## Sundays 10am The Message Conversation Study - In Person


