# Ash Wednesday Worship Service – February 22<sup>nd</sup> at 7pm



# Sundays 10am The Message Conversation Study – In Person



In many regions, pancakes are served, remembering a time when people consumed milk, fats, and eggs before Ash Wednesday. Similar consumptions of fatty foods caused this day also to be

named Fat Tuesday or Mardi Gras.

When I wrote a year ago, I reminded you that home is where the heart is; home is where you hang your hat; and home is where your story begins. That is as true today as it has ever been! You know what Habitat does: it builds decent, stable homes, and bright futures for hard-working, low-income people. The last two

years were tough on Habitat, no doubt about it. But Habitat has rebounded magnificently. It is just now beginning a 10-home project on Bridgeport's Chopsey Hill Road, just off Route 8's Exit 5. Volunteer opportunities are abounding! Habitat is one of Bridgeport's success stories. It has built "green" homes for 37 years, over 280 homes to date, for 1,100 people. Nichols has consistently contributed through our donations and volunteer efforts. Last year, the pews from our now revamped chancel area went to Habitat's ReStore where they sold for over \$1,000, money then spent on new homes for hard working, deserving people. On January 16<sup>th</sup> we celebrated the Martin Luther King Day of Service. MLK once said: "Life's most persistent and urgent question is: 'What are you doing for others?'" He went on to say "Everyone can be great, because <u>any</u>one can serve. You don't have to make the subject and verb agree to serve; you only need a heart full of grace and a soul generated by love." And that's also the message: of Habitat: grace and love. And service.
