Grace: Experiencing God's Goodness in a Broken World - by Pastor David Piscatelli

1Corinthians 1:3-4 (NRS) Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. ⁴I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus. Ephesians 2:8-10 (NRS) For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God-- ⁹not the result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹⁰For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

The Apostle Paul often writes about grace. It is contained in the opening of almost all his letters and described in most of them as well. The grace he is talking about is God's grace. Paul extends the Corinthians grace from God and Jesus, a grace that has been given by God. In the above passage in Ephesians, he reminds this early church that grace is a free gift from God that provides the basis for their faith and salvation. This gift is not for our own consumption, it is to be share in the world around us. Grace is one of those church words that many people use but is not deeply understood. It is all over scriptures, the hymnal, and pastoral sermons. While grace is not meant to be difficult to comprehend, it is something that is often made more complicated than it needs to be. In its most basic form, grace is experiencing God's goodness in a broken world.

God's grace is an outflowing of God's love. It is unconditional, it is active, and it is eternal. The earth and all things in it are created because of love. It is God's nature to love, and God's love is a free gift to each one of us. Yes, God loves you and God loves me! God loves us not because of anything we have done or will do – but is freely given. There is nothing we can or need to do to earn it. Yet sometimes we can get hung up with the "free" part of grace. We make the faulty assumption that God only loves us when we behave, or are at church, or when we do all kinds of good things for the world around us. While those might be things we should do and God wants us to do, they are NOT a condition for receiving God's grace. But grace like most forms of love is much better understood when you experience it.

As is often the case during Lent, I will be doing a sermon series. My sermon series is, you guessed it, "Grace: Experiencing God's Goodness in a Broken World." Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 22nd and continues for 40 days (excluding Sundays) until Easter. Each week we will explore how we can experience God's goodness, grace, and love in our lives today. We will be invited to see how we receive salvation, mercy, and healing as we engage the scriptures on Sunday mornings. Lent is an opportunity for each of us to grow in faith and understanding of the goodness of God's grace in Jesus Christ. It is also a time to consider how use the love and grace that God provides to help make Christ visible to the world. Lent is meant to be a serious time, not a somber time, and each Sunday is an opportunity to celebrate what God is still doing today. God is still changing hearts, giving us strength in our difficulties, and transforming lives in a world full of sickness and sadness.

During this Lenten season, it is my prayer and hope that each one of us experience God's grace in a fresh and new way. God seeks to pour out love upon each one of us in manner that feels real and tangible. We are each a unique child of God who is created to make God's love visible in the world. May this be a time where we truly experience God's goodness in the broken places of our own lives as God's free gift of Jesus Christ draws us into a deeper relationship with Him.

Sundays 10am The Message Conversation Study – In Person



Thank you for your faithfulness in supporting the ministries of Jesus Christ at Nichols UMC. Last year, in-person worship continued to recover from the pandemic restrictions of 2021. By September, we returned to conducting all three services on Sunday. We worked with a deficit budget all year, but thankfully received enough donations to exceed

our budgeted income by \$11,000. However, we exceeded our budgeted expenses by \$4,300. Fortunately, we still have a surplus from the PPP funds from 2020 to cover the shortfall. God's blessings and your faithfulness are clearly evident. As has been the case for the last few years, we establish our anticipated budget based on our expected ministry spending, knowing that our stewardship campaign doesn't begin until January. Below is the budget for 2023 which shows there are still some challenges ahead. The income is based on what we received last year, so we are hopeful that our pledges and giving exceed that number so that we can avoid the projected deficit. The expenses include pay increases for all staff members agreed upon by Staff Parish and the Church Council. Our leadership will continue to work together to be good stewards of what God gives us through your generosity.
